On behalf of Clearwater's Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA), I am pleased to provide the Annual Report for Fiscal Year 2022-2023. This was a year of big accomplishments as the CRA achieved many goals as part of our revitalization efforts in our two community redevelopment areas.

Significant milestones included:

- After five years of dedicated work, the community celebrated the establishment of the city's second community redevelopment area in North Greenwood.
- The Cleveland Streetscape Phase III construction project was built creating a safe and beautiful complete street in the Downtown Gateway neighborhood.
- The CRA Business Assistance Grant Program was expanded, making it easier for businesses to access funding to reinvest back into the economic livelihood of downtown.

This report provides greater insight into these accomplishments and projects transforming our service area. This past year, our city also celebrated the completion of a catalytic project with the opening of Coachman Park, our bigger and better signature waterfront park that paves the way for a newly reimagined downtown.

The CRA trustees and dedicated staff are excited to keep this momentum moving forward in creating a stronger downtown and North Greenwood. Together, we look forward to our community redevelopment goals creating more opportunities and excitement for residents, businesses, and all who visit Clearwater.

WHAT IS CRA?

The Clearwater Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) is a public entity created by the city of Clearwater government as a community redevelopment area. Established under the Florida Community Redevelopment Act of 1969 (Chapter 163, Part III, Florida Statutes).

THE CRA OBJECTIVE IS TO



Carry out redevelopment activities to prevent, reduce, or eliminate blighted conditions.



Improve the economic health and quality of life.



Facilitate and encourage employment and entrepreneurial opportunities.



Encourage public and private investment within the redevelopment areas.

HOW IS THE CRA FUNDED?

The CRA invests back in the community using a Tax Increment Financing (TIF) model.

Increment funds are generated from property taxes that have increased in value since the date the CRA was established. This increment amount is deposited into the CRA Trust Fund to fund community improvements outlined in the Community Redevelopment Area Plan.

The CRA works to redevelop two unique areas, each with its own plan, budget, and unique goals for the future.

Increase access to high paying jobs through workforce development, business assistance programs, and support for entrepreneurs.

Sustain a high quality of life through community engagement, access to recreational opportunities, celebrating the unique community culture, improving public health, and protecting the environment.

Provide opportunities for youth to live healthy and economically secure lives.


NORTH GREENWOOD COMMUNITY GRANTS

Five million in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding was allocated by the city of Clearwater to jump start programming in the North Greenwood community. This money provides the North Greenwood CRA with a funding source through 2026 until revenues can be generated from the newly created TIF.

This seed funding fueled the North Greenwood Community Grants Program which provided local organizations with funding to support their work towards revitalizing the community.

360 Eats \$30,000 Awarded

Distributes meals in the community by partnering with local grocery stores, food distributors, farms, and restaurants.




Provides a weekly program for men (18+) to organically gather and address issues in men's health and wellbeing.

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BUILDING A NEW FOUNDATION IN THE DOWNTOWN GATEWAY

IMPROVING THE STREETSCAPE

Construction within the Downtown Gateway will improve one mile along Cleveland Street and Gulf-to-Bay Boulevard. Improvements will beautify and create a safer and more pedestrian-friendly commercial corridor. Construction will be completed by the end of 2023.



IMPROVEMENTS INCLUDED



Replacement of underground utilities (water, stormwater, and sewer).



New sidewalks, bike lanes, safer intersections and turn lanes.



Enhanced stormwater treatment planting areas and extensive landscaping.



Reconfiguration of on-street parking.



Development of new public plaza space.

NEW PUBLIC SPACE COMING SOON

With the Cleveland Streetscape Phase III construction project, the configuration of the diagonal intersection of Cleveland Street at Gulf-to-Bay Boulevard changed creating new outdoor space. This newly reclaimed roadway area will be converted into a flexible public gathering area called **MERCADO**

The name, Mercado, honors Clearwater's Hispanic community who call the surrounding area home. Mercado will be home to a large colorful mosaic tile public artwork installation. Construction of Mercado is anticipated to begin in Spring 2024 and wrap up by the end of 2024.

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BUSINESS ASSISTANCE GRANT PROGRAM

The Downtown Clearwater CRA Business Assistance Grant Program provides support to commercial property owners and businesses to help reduce blight, activate vacant commercial spaces, and make businesses economically robust and thriving.



Business Renovation

Assists with funding to renovate occupied spaces with long-term or short-term uses that generate significant downtown pedestrian foot traffic.



Restaurant Operations: Essential Equipment

Offers up to **\$3,500** to assist Food and Beverage operators with purchasing or repairing essential equipment.



Façade Improvement

Provides assistance to improve the exterior attractiveness of the buildings through Façade Design Services or Financial Incentive Program.



Downtown Gateway Business Economic Recovery

Offers up to **\$25,000** in assistance for financial loss related to the Cleveland Streetscape Phase III construction.



Sidewalk Café Furniture

Provides up to \$7,500 to furnish approved sidewalk café areas.



Vacancy Reduction

Reduces empty ground floor commercial spaces by providing **50%** of the cost of building improvements up to **\$500,000** for exterior and interior improvements. An additional **\$500,000** is available for catalytic uses that serve as a downtown destination.

DOWNTOWN WAYFINDING POINTS TO THE RIGHT DIRECTION



PLACEMAKING SAILS AHEAD WITH POP-UP ART AND INSTALLATIONS

The Clearwater Community Sailing Center (CCSC) sailed into Station Square Park with their pop-up art installation "Winds of Change" featuring three boats displaying sails painted by the talented student artists from the Pinellas County Center for the Arts at Gibbs High School. The vivid artwork of marine wildlife honored Clearwater's maritime history and dedication to environmental stewardship.

This installation was the first recipient of the Placemaking and Resident Engagement Grant Program. The three month display kicked off with a special "Sailing Out of Summer Party" to celebrate the artists and the graduates of CCSC's summer camp programs. The event featured back-to-school giveaway, raffles, games, music, and a paint-by-numbers mural activity.

DAYDREAMING: **Niki Butcher's**

Hand-Painted Photography

Niki Butcher's exhibit showcased the historical, beautiful, and sometimes unusual aspects of our world through the eyes of a thoughtful optimist. Her colorful exhibit featured a collection spanning five decades. During this 10-month installation Niki celebrated the launch of her debut book at a special book signing event in Clearwater.

CUBA:

The Natural Beauty-The Photographic Expeditions of Clyde Butcher

Clyde Butcher's iconic black and white landscape photography returned to Clearwater, this time showcasing a collection commissioned by the United Nations on the mountainous lands of Cuba. During this five month installation Clyde shared stories of his expeditions across Cuba at a special evening lecture event held at The Bilheimer Capitol Theatre.

EL ARTE:

Echoes of Cuba

Expanding on our artistic journey through Cuba, 19 local Tampa Bay artists representing all art mediums were invited to display their artwork alongside Clyde Butcher's collection. The exhibit kicked off with a special grand opening reception with the artists at a unique library after dark experience complete with salsa music.

What is the DDB?

The Clearwater Downtown Development Board is a special taxing district that works to promote, facilitate and support activities that sustain, promote and advance downtown revitalization and to attract businesses and residents to Downtown Clearwater.

The 322-acre DDB district is located around the traditional downtown core of Clearwater on the western side of the Downtown Clearwater Community Redevelopment Area.
